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## Zastrow fills stat sheets

### Jefferson star player of year

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For some, getting a double-double was an accomplishment.

For Lin Zastrow, it was her average.

The senior on the Jefferson girls basketball team not only averaged 20.4 points and 11 rebounds per game this season, she also added four assists, three steals and three blocks.

The 6-foot-4 Zastrow was selected as the Journal Sentinel's Milwaukee-area player of the year after she was recently named state player of the year by both the Associated Press and the Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association.

"Nowadays, it's kind of rare unless you're a player of that height to average a double-double," Jefferson coach Dena Smith said. "But I don't think you can define Lin by just her points and rebounds. She does everything. She steals the ball, makes incredible passes and then is a tremendous shot-blocker. Defining her as far as points and rebounds doesn't do her, as a complete player, any justice.

"Seeing her at practice for four years, hanging out with her, seeing her interact with our team and stuff, I don't think a lot of people have seen how truly talented she really is and how much more potential she has. She's going to improve probably 10-fold playing at Wisconsin. People are going to be in awe of what she can really do."

Zastrow, who picked UW over Marquette, led Jefferson to a 22-2 record and first-place finish in the Southern Lakes Conference.

She has played all five positions throughout the season as well.

"Ever since I was little, I was always the point guard until I started growing," Zastrow said. "I think it's fun that I can play inside or outside. I'm glad I got blessed with my ability to be able to do that. I think it's such a hard match-up for people. (Wisconsin coach) Lisa Stone said if a bigger player is guarding

me, I'll be on the outside. If a shorter player is guarding me, I'll be on the inside. I can do both."

Last season, Zastrow also made the all-area team after averaging 17.1 points.

"I just thank those people who voted for me because I think last year I couldn't believe what I got," Zastrow said. "So this year is unbelievable."

**Coach of the year:** Marquis Hines, Milwaukee Vincent - Hines was also named state coach of the year by the Associated Press after leading the Vikings to their first Division 1 state championship in their tournament debut.

In his first full season with Vincent, Hines led the team to an 18-0 start. The Vikings defeated Antigo, 45-21, in the state quarterfinals; Merrill, 54-47, in the semifinals; and Sheboygan North, 49-45, in the championship.

It was the first time a Division 1 team won state in its tournament debut since Brookfield Central in 1985.

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
